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# Trail Master's Diary: Woodville

One of my favorite things to do in summer is eat outdoors. It doesn't have to be fancy. I just enjoy eating and taking in the beautiful weather during our all too short summer season. It's even better to go for a nice walk first before indulging. Walk 'n Mass Volkssport Club invites you to do both with scenic 5km and 10km walks in Woodville on August 11, followed by the traditional Club Picnic.

Woodville is a quaint village in the town of Hopkinton. It was established as an historic district in 2005, encompassing 97 properties. In the early to mid 1800s, Woodville was known for its industry, including cotton, shoe, boot, and livery factories. The Hopkinton Sheeting Company is believed to be one of the earliest cotton weaving factories in the country. Many of the homes from that time can be found in the village. Also in the early 1800s, it was believed that the water flowing from the cedar swamp to Lake Whitehall contained healing powers when iron, sulfur, and magnesium were found in the springs. A resort hotel was built, attracting visitors from all over to drink or bathe in the water. In 1894, Boston seized Lake Whitehall as a reservoir and forced the factories along the shore to close or move. In 1909, a massive fire destroyed most of the remaining industry.

Both the 5km and 10km walk routes pass through the village center with the fire station and post office before heading to scenic Winter Street. Take note of the business located at #17, Bulldog Fire and Emergency Apparatus. Since the 1930s, this plot of land has housed the firetruck industry, beginning with the legendary Clarence Farrar. The route

continues through residential neighborhoods and passes by Lake Whitehall before entering more neighborhoods. Walkers will then go by the Sanctuary at Woodville and American Legion War Memorial before heading back to the finish and picnic for the 5km and the checkpoint for the 10km.

The second loop of the 10km route starts out on Winter Street before heading to a wooded path along Lake Whitehall. There are great views of the lake along the way. It is no longer used to provide fresh water to Boston, but is popular for water sports. POC Bev Lange and I spotted lots of recreational boats on the

water enjoying the beautiful weather the day we walked the route. After leaving the woods, the route continues through Evergreen Cemetery

and residential neighborhoods before heading back to the finish and picnic time!

The 5km route has an AVA rating of 2A. It is on paved routes with moderate inclines, making it difficult for baby strollers. The 10km route has an AVA rating of 2C due to the natural path through the woods with roots and rocks, making it unsuitable for baby strollers. Neither route is suitable for wheelchairs.

Come enjoy the great outdoors with Walk 'n Mass in Woodville on Saturday, August 11. Walk the 5km or 10km route, then stay to enjoy good food and company at the Club Picnic. Hope to see you on the trail!
