Trail Master's Diary: Newton

Those of us who have walked the Newton YRE through the years know that POC Marianne Marshall has several routes so she can mix things up. This way we get to cover a lot of ground exploring Newton.

Now Marianne has come up with a whole new route that takes walkers through some previously unseen areas. Across the street from the start at Newton Free Library walkers will see the Newton Town Hall and War Memorial, built in 1932 in the Colonial Revival style. Then after passing through the Newton Centre Playground, both the 5km and 10km routes head to the Newton Centre Fire Department with the 911 Memorial in front. It honors the 8 Newton citizens lost in the attacks, as well as provides inscriptions with the timeline of events that day. There are two sculptures with the Roman numerals XI and IX

that mirror each other no matter how you look at them. Take some time and look around. Then walkers will visit the WWI Memorial, a flagpole inscribed with names of the men memorialized for their service in that conflict.

Both route distances pass through shopping and residential areas including Lake Avenue with beautiful homes on Crystal Lake, a 33 acre natural great pond before the 5km route heads back to the Newton Free Library. The 10km route passes through more residential areas featuring homes with historical colors and details. Walkers then head back through the Newton Centre Playground with tennis and basketball courts before returning to the library. Join Marianne for a group walk, or explore the new route on your own. It's a great way to see what Newton has to offer!



In Memoriam: Ruth Cade & Charlotte Phillips by Beate Hait

In early December, we lost two AVA legends: Ruth Cade (Mar. 27, 1931-Dec. 1, 2021) and Charlotte Phillips (Sept. 6, 1931-Dec. 6, 2021). A native of Vermont, Charlotte was the founder of Twin State Volkssport Association and was also a member of many other Northeast Region Clubs. When my family first met them in 1992, Charlotte and Ruth traveled to events in their RV along with their dogs. They enjoyed volunteering wherever they went. For Walk 'n Mass, they helped with Trail Take-down in Sturbridge, Annisquam, Gloucester (1998, 2000 and 2001, respectively), and Checkpoint and Trail Marking at Deerfield/Holyoke/Quabbin weekend in 1999. Eventually they wintered in Ruth's native state, Texas, and summered in Vermont. As members of the Army, Charlotte attained the rank of Colonel and Ruth the rank of Lt. Colonel. For the past 14 years, they lived in San Antonio's Army Retirement Center, but they still participated in AVA events, were staunch supporters of AVA through the Big Give, and attended the biennial conventions.
